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SCHOONER CLARK IS LOST.

Strikes on Ledge on Maine Coast and Sinks—Her Crew Escapes.

PORTLAND, Me., July 2.- The loss of the four-masted schooner Alice E. Clark in Penobscot Bay last night was reported to-day to the managing owners, J. S. Winslow and Company of this city. a heavy gale the schooner struck on Frank's Ledge and sank. She was full of water at high tide. The schooner was in command of Capt. McDonald, and was bound to Bangor with a cargo of coal from Newport News. The crew escaped. The Alice E. Clark was built at Bath in 1898 and registered 1,621 gross tonnage, 227.4 feet long, 43 feet beam; and 20.7 feet deep. She carried a crew of eight.

The schooner originally cost \$64,000, and at the present time probabily was worth between \$45,000 and \$50,000. She was only partially insured. The cargo was consigned to the Maine Central Rail-

road Company.
